I am sure many stories will be told of these last couple of months of how we have all survived and adapted to the 'new normal'.



For me here in Dunedin it was, at times, frustrating. I had to advocate for Krystal to have the right supports in place so as to ensure her safety and wellbeing as I was not able to be part of her 'bubble' over Level 4 as I continued in my work and did not want to put her at risk. As per usual, parents can get very creative with resources and I managed to negotiate a few changes to make sure she had the support she needed. Applying for the Covid-19 self-employment grant was also interesting with IRD

and MSD sending mixed messages, but we got the right result in the end. Although Krystal's income is not a lot from her job, it makes a huge difference to her ability to have more choices that she can have control over.

Krystal's garden that Judith and Krystal worked on during Level 3 – and which is now providing plenty of fresh green veggies!!

I think these recent times have also brought about positives. Families out walking together, having time to just 'take a breath' from the busyness of life. Whatever this experience has been for you and your *whānau*, we are all the stronger for it!

How lucky we are to have such a great and committed team as our PVI board. Bringing together people from different communities around New Zealand, family circumstances and different ages and stages in the journey of our children's lives can be challenging. However, we all come together with one objective: to help make a difference. These last few months have been tough for everyone and the extra workload and responsibilities as a board member have been challenging. I am proud to be part of the team we have and it was wonderful to finally meet face to face in July in Wellington.


Altogether 43 individuals, including 33 parent delegates representing 21 families, attended the 2020 PVI Annual Conference throughout the course of the weekend. This year the conference was at the Waipuna Conference Suites at Highbrook, Auckland, with accommodation at the Quest Waipuna.

Parents came from as far north as Wellsford down to Twizel in the South. Parent attendance as per PVI Board region:

### PVI Mission

To provide a community of support for parents/*whānau* of a vision-impaired person.

### PVI Purpose

1. To empower parents and *whānau* to support their blind, deafblind, and vision-impaired children.
2. To improve the health, welfare, education, and social opportunities of vision-impaired children.
3. To benefit the children and *whānau* of vision-impaired children within New Zealand.
4. To promote, develop and maintain a nationwide support network.
5. To promote and provide ongoing communication for parents and parent support groups of vision-impaired children.
6. To foster communication and co-ordination of services between PVI, agencies and other community groups.
7. To be proactive in all areas and concerns related to vision impaired children and their *whānau*/family.
8. To be beneficial to the wider community.





**PVI values**

PVI believes that blind, low vision and visually impaired persons and their families have the right to the same dreams, opportunities, and safeguards as all other citizens.

PVI believes that all people are unique and different, and that each is capable of great things.

PVI believes that all communities are able to fully include all blind, low vision and visually impaired persons and their families.
