Description of the Entity's Outcomes*

What did PVI do?

1. Governance.

- Held 2021 AGM with 3 Board members duly re-elected
- Held Zoom Board meetings (x3) alongside face-to-face Board meetings (September 21, February 22, June 22)

2. Support and advocacy.

Individual advocacy and support provided directly to PVI families in the following ways:

- Emails of support written for parents
- Drafting up letters of complaint for parents and providing advice on responding to exclusion and discrimination
- Funding applications for adaptive equipment on behalf of families
- Facebook and messenger interactions and conversations
- Phone and Zoom calls with parents

3. COVID-19 response.

- The additional stress and cognitive demand of a global pandemic and the impact of lockdown left Board members and parents alike with reduced capacity and facing additional challenges at home.
- PVI continued to manage COVID-19 and related lockdowns, information dissemination, and vaccine-related details as an organisation and on behalf of members
- Continued to work through lockdowns and manage organisational matters
- Received in October 2021 funding for a joint project with Kāpō Māori Aotearoa and Blind Low Vision NZ from the Ministry of Health vaccine communications funding.
- Applied for (and received in August 2021, the next reporting period) funding for Covid in the Community preparation fund.

4. Successful funding requests

- Successful HRC application for \$30,000 from the Health Delivery Research Activation Grant for tāngata kāpō research. This project will further develop an emerging research relationship with Kāpō Māori Aotearoa in order to determine key research priorities for tāngata kāpō Māori and their whānau over the next 5 years. Central to this exercise is ensuring tāngata kāpō Māori and tāngata whāhaka self-determination with regards to the direction of health service delivery, disability data, and related research.
- Blind Low Vision Operational Grant Round 1: \$98,000

- Ministry of Health Care in the Community Fund: \$33,500 to provide covid-related support to families

Basis of Preparation

Parents of Vision Impaired (NZ) Inc has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST, except for Debtors and Creditors which are stated inclusive of GST.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies have been employed in the preparation of the financial statements.

Grants and operational funding

Grants received are recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance as revenue when the conditions of the grant agreement have been met. Where there is no use or return condition the grant is recognised as income received. Grants received for which the requirements have not been met at balance date are shown as Grants Income in Advance under Current Liabilities in the Statement of Financial Position.

Donations

Miscellaneous donations, recoveries and registrations are recognised as revenue when received.

Fixed assets and intangibles

Fixed assets and intangibles are recorded at cost and are depreciated or amortised on a diminishing value basis. Fixed assets are not revalued.

Liabilities

General liabilities, other than provisions, are recognised when the goods and services to which they relate are received. Creditors are carried at the amount of cash which is required to settle those liabilities.

Statement of Financial Performance

Depreciation and Amortisation

Fixed assets and Intangibles are depreciated so as to charge their cost or other acquisition value over their estimated useful life on a diminishing value basis.

INDEPENDENT ASSURANCE PRACTITIONER'S REVIEW REPORT
Report on the Performance Report

We have reviewed the accompanying performance report of Parents of the Vision Impaired on pages 2 to 14 which comprises the entity information, the statement of service performance, the statement of financial performance and statement of cash flows for the year ended 30 June 2022, the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2022, the statement of accounting policies and notes to the performance report.

The Responsibility of the Trustee for the Performance Report

The Trustee is responsible on behalf of the entity for:

- a) Identifying outcomes and outputs, and quantifying the outputs to the extent practicable, that are relevant, reliable, comparable and understandable, to report in the statement of service performance;
- b) the preparation and fair presentation of the performance report which comprises:
 - o the entity information
 - o the statement of service performance; and
 - o the statement of financial performance, statement of financial position, statement of cash flows, statement of accounting policies and notes to the performance reportin accordance with Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For Profit) issued in New Zealand by the New Zealand Accounting Standards Board, and
- c) for such internal control as the Trustee determines is necessary to enable the preparation of the performance report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Assurance Practitioner's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the performance report. We conducted our review of the statement of financial performance, statement of financial position, statement of cash flows, statement of accounting policies and notes to the performance report in accordance with International Standard on Review Engagements (New Zealand) (ISRE (NZ)) 2400 (Revised), Review of Historical Financial Statements Performed by an Assurance Practitioner who is not the Auditor of the Entity, and the review of the entity information and statement of service performance in accordance with the International Standard on Assurance Engagements (New Zealand) ISAE (NZ) 3000 (Revised). Those standards require us to conclude whether anything has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the performance report, taken as a whole, is not prepared in all material respects in accordance with the Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit). Those standards also require that we comply with ethical requirements.

A review of the performance report in accordance with ISRE (NZ) 2400(Revised) and ISAE (NZ) 3000 (Revised) is a limited assurance engagement. We will perform procedures, primarily consisting of making enquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluate the evidence obtained. The procedures selected depend on our judgement, including the areas identified where a material misstatement is likely to arise and includes performing procedures to obtain evidence and evaluating whether the reported outcomes and outputs, and quantification of the outputs to the extent practicable, are relevant, reliable, comparable and understandable.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less than those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand) and ISAE (NZ) 3000 (Revised). Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on the performance report.

Other than in our capacity as assurance practitioner we have no relationship with, or interests in, Parents of the Vision Impaired.

Conclusion

Based on our review, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that:

- a) the reported outcomes and outputs, and quantification of the outputs to the extent practicable, are not suitable;
- b) the performance report on pages 2 to 14 does not present fairly, in all material respects:
 - o the financial position of Parents of the Vision Impaired as at 30 June 2022, and (of) its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended; and
 - o the entity information and its service performance for the year then ended in accordance with Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For Profit).
